# Access to Information Act

Canada Foundation for Innovation Annual report to Parliament

April 1, 2013 - March 31, 2014



#### INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the *Access to Information Act* is to extend the present laws of Canada to provide a right of access to information in records under the control of a government institution. This is in accordance with the principles that government information should be available to the public that necessary exceptions to the right of access should be limited and specific, and that decisions on the disclosure of government information should be reviewed independently of government. This report has been prepared in accordance with section 72 of the *Access to Information Act*. The Canada Foundation for Innovation's (CFI) annual reports are tabled in Parliament in accordance with section 72 of the *Access to Information Act*.

Created by the Government of Canada in 1997, the CFI strives to build our nation's capacity to undertake world-class research and technology development to benefit Canadians. Thanks to CFI investment in state-of-the-art facilities and equipment, universities, colleges, research hospitals and non-profit research institutions are attracting and retaining the world's top talent, training the next generation of researchers, supporting private-sector innovation and creating high-quality jobs that strengthen Canada's position in today's knowledge economy.

The infrastructure funded by the CFI includes the state-of-the-art equipment, laboratories, databases and buildings necessary to conduct research. This infrastructure fosters collaboration among the academic, private, public, and non-profit sectors on a wide range of research projects and across many disciplines. Although the CFI is not alone in supporting innovation in Canada, it is the country's leading funding organization dedicated exclusively to supporting advanced research infrastructure.

#### **2013-14 ACTIVITY**

The CFI became subject to the *Access to Information Act* (ATIA) in 2007. Nevertheless, from the CFI's inception in 1997, it has followed the spirit of the ATIA with respect to requests for information. Thus the principles of openness, transparency and public accountability, which are central to the ATIA, are deeply embedded within the culture at the CFI.

During the last year, the CFI received four requests for information under the ATIA, which were all completed within this reporting period. In addition, the CFI received and completed six requests for ATIA consultations from other government institutions during the last year.

## ACCESS TO INFORMATION AND PRIVACY (ATIP) OFFICE AND REPORTING STRUCTURE

The Vice-President of Finance and Corporate Services has overall delegated responsibility for the administration of the ATIA laws within the CFI. The day-to-day activities and operations related to the ATIA are coordinated by the Director of Corporate Services who reports directly to this Vice-President. The Director is assisted by the Manager of Administration and by an external consultant, who has expertise on access and privacy issues within the context of the research environment. Effectively, these CFI officials collaborate part-time to manage a small ATIP office with the following role and mandate:

- Responding to formal ATIA requests and consultations;
- Promoting awareness of the ATIA within the CFI through timely communications, training sessions, new staff orientation sessions, regular staff meeting updates and individual consultations:
- Ensuring compliance with the ATIA by developing and implementing effective policies and guidelines;
- Developing expertise through formal training opportunities, attending ATIP community events and conferences and establishing network contacts;
- Representing the CFI on all official Access to Information business including liaising with the Information Commissioner and the Treasury Board Secretariat; and
- Completing annual reports to Parliament, annual statistics and updates to the Info Source publications.

#### **DELEGATION ORDERS**

The President of the CFI has delegated certain ATIA responsibilities to the aforementioned ATIP officials. The specific level of authority delegated to each official is presented in the table found in Annex A.

#### STATISTICAL REPORT AND INTERPRETATION

The CFI received four formal requests under the ATIA in 2013-14, which is slightly above its seven-year average of 3.4 requests per year. The CFI has received a total of 24 requests since becoming subject to the ATIA in 2007 as summarized in Table 1.

Although the CFI does not have sufficient data for meaningful trend analysis and level of activity comparison, based on recent activity the CFI should expect between three to four requests per year. Furthermore, the CFI is pleased to provide its comments on the CFI statistical report for 2013-14 which can be found in Annex B of this report.

The CFI's responses to the four requests received were completed during this reporting period. Of the four requests, three were submitted by the media and one was submitted by the private sector. One of the requests was completed within 15 days, one was completed within 16 to 30 days, and the other two were completed within 61to120 days primarily due to third party consultation requirements. Two of the requests were disclosed in full where as for the other two, the CFI applied the mandatory exemption set out in subsection 19(1) of the ATIA, which protects personal information about others. Two requests also had exemptions applied under subsections 20(1)(b) and 20(1)(c), which basically protect confidential information. One request had exemptions applied under subsections 20(1)(d), which protects information the disclosure of

which could lead to interference with contractual negotiations. One request had exemptions applied under subsection 21(1)(b) which protects information that contains an account of consultations in which directors, officers or employees of a government institution, a minister of the Crown or staff of the minister participate. The CFI did not invoke any exclusions in 2013-14. No additional fees were collected from the requesters except for the five dollar application fee.

The CFI received six consultations during the last year from other government institutions. All six consultations were completed within one to15 days and were recommended for full disclosure. The CFI did not receive any consultations on Cabinet Confidences during this period.

Total costs associated with all aspects of administering the ATIA for the reporting period are estimated at \$22,000, which represents an increase of approximately 38 percent over the seven year average of \$16,000 per year. These costs include salaries of \$16,000 and Goods and Services of \$6,000.

There were three CFI employees and one consultant dedicated part-time to ATIA activities during 2013-14.

#### **EDUCATION AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES**

Normally the CFI provides an overview of ATIP principles to new CFI employees as part of our orientation session. Unfortunately there was no new employee orientation session offered in 2013-14. The current orientation presentation was made available to all new employees and a new format of the orientation session is being designed for 2014. In addition, ATIP-specific training materials for all CFI staff were reviewed and are currently being revised. An ATIP staff training session is being scheduled for late spring or early summer of 2014. Needless to say, the ATIP staff is always available to all CFI employees for consultation and assistance. As part of our ongoing training, the ATIP office personnel participate in the ATIP community meetings.

#### **ACCESS TO INFORMATION POLICIES**

The CFI did not introduce any significant new access to information policies during this reporting period. However, the CFI has been reviewing and revising existing access to information statements and literature that is targeted at stakeholders who apply to the CFI for funding. In particular, we continue to review information that may be shared during the review process in association with other federal or provincial funding agencies.

#### COMPLAINTS AND INVESTIGATIONS

There were no complaints made to the Information Commissioner about the CFI during this reporting period.

## ACCESS TO INFORMATION REQUESTS PROCESSING TIME MONITORING

The Director, Corporate Services tracks and records the time required to process each ATIA request as well as the elapsed time to complete the request. This is done individually for each request and timely status updates are reported to the Vice-President, Finance and Corporate Services as the requests are being processed. Similarly, whenever an extension is required to complete a request, the Vice-President is informed. Updates are presented at each Board meeting on the ATI requests completed since the last Board meeting, as well as the date of completion. The Director, Corporate Services compiles all individual ATI request processing times and reviews this annually with the Vice-President, Finance and Corporate Services before completing the Annual Statistical report (see Annex B).


