Canada Foundation for Innovation Annual report to Parliament

April 1, 2015 - March 31, 2016



INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the Privacy Act is to extend the present laws of Canada that protect the privacy of individuals with respect to personal information about themselves held by a government institution and to provide individuals with a right of access to that information. This report has been prepared in accordance with section 72 of the Privacy Act. The Canada Foundation for Innovation's (CFI) annual reports are tabled in Parliament in accordance with section 72 of the Privacy Act.

Created by the Government of Canada in 1997, the CFI strives to build our nation's capacity to undertake world-class research and technology development to benefit Canadians. Thanks to CFI investment in state-of-the-art facilities and equipment, universities, colleges, research hospitals and non-profit research institutions are attracting and retaining the world's top talent, training the next generation of researchers, supporting private-sector innovation and creating high-quality jobs that strengthen Canada's position in today's knowledge economy.

The infrastructure funded by the CFI includes state-of-the-art equipment, laboratories, databases and buildings necessary to conduct research. This infrastructure fosters collaboration among the academic, private, public, and non-profit sectors on a wide range of research projects and across many disciplines. Although the CFI is not alone in supporting innovation in Canada, it is the country's leading funding organization dedicated exclusively to supporting advanced research infrastructure.

2015-16 HIGHLIGHTS

The CFI became subject to the Privacy Act in 2007 and received its first privacy request in 2011-12. From its inception in 1997, the CFI has followed the spirit of the Act with respect to requests for personal information. Thus, principles related to accountability and data protection, which are central to the Privacy Act, are deeply embedded within the CFI culture.

The CFI did not receive any requests under the Privacy Act during this reporting period (2015-16).

ACCESS TO INFORMATION AND PRIVACY (ATIP) OFFICE AND REPORTING STRUCTURE

The Vice-President of Finance and Corporate Services has overall delegated responsibility for the administration of the Privacy Act laws within CFI. The day-to-day activities and operations related to the Act are coordinated by the Director of Corporate Services who reports directly to this Vice-President. The Director is assisted by the Manager of Administration and by an external consultant who has expertise in access and privacy issues within the context of the research environment. Effectively, these CFI officials collaborate part-time to manage a small ATIP office with the following role and mandate:

- · Responding to formal privacy requests and consultations;
- Promoting awareness of the Act within the CFI through timely communications, training sessions, new staff orientation sessions, regular staff meeting updates and individual consultations;
- Ensuring compliance with the Act by developing and implementing effective policies and guidelines;
- Developing expertise through formal training opportunities, attending ATIP community events and conferences and establishing network contacts;
- Representing the CFI on all official Privacy Act business including liaising with the Privacy Commissioner and the Treasury Board Secretariat; and,
- Completing annual reports to Parliament, annual statistics and updates to the Info Source publications.

DELEGATION ORDERS

The President of the CFI has delegated certain Privacy Act responsibilities to the aforementioned ATIP officials. The specific level of authority delegated to each official is presented in the table found in Annex A.

STATISTICAL REPORT AND INTERPRETATION

As mentioned, the CFI did not receive any requests under the Act in 2015-16. This represents the ninth year that the CFI has been subject to the Act. During this time it has only received four privacy requests to date. Therefore the organization does not have historical data that would be meaningful for trend analysis or for levels of activity comparison. Nevertheless, the CFI is pleased to present a copy of the CFI statistical report for 2015-16, which can be found in Annex B, and to provide its comments about these statistics.

Each year, the CFI reviews between 500 and 1,200 research infrastructure proposals, depending on its funding program schedule. In 2015-16, the CFI received approximately 503 infrastructure proposals. Although these proposals are submitted to the CFI by institutions, each proposal contains personal information belonging to one or more researchers affiliated with the applicant institution. The CFI Board makes funding decisions on all proposals using, among other criteria, the candid written opinions of experts whose identities are not revealed to the applicants. At first glance, it would appear extraordinary that this process has not resulted in at least a few requests each year under the Act. However, this has not been the case and the CFI believes that the low request rate is attributable in some measure to its proactive approach to disclosure. Since its inception, it has been the CFI's practice to informally provide applicants with full and timely feedback instead of waiting for formal requests for information. All funding decisions and written expert reports are released to the institutions within a few days of a Board decision.

Total costs associated with all aspects of administering the Act are estimated to be \$4,583. This year's costs include salaries of \$2,040 and goods and services of \$2,543. There were three CFI employees and one consultant dedicated part-time to privacy activities during 2015-16.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES

The CFI provides an overview of ATIP principles to all new CFI employees as part of our orientation documentation. During the last year, the CFI did not organize any corporate-wide ATIP training sessions since most staff had participated in training sessions the previous year. Needless to say, the ATIP staff is always available to all CFI employees for consultation and assistance. As part of our ongoing training, the ATIP office personnel participates in the ATIP community meetings.

PRIVACY POLICIES

The CFI did not introduce any significant new privacy policies during this reporting period. However, we have reviewed and revised our privacy information statements which are targeted at researchers and institutions who apply to the CFI for funding.

COMPLAINTS AND INVESTIGATIONS

There were no complaints made to the Privacy Commissioner about the CFI during this reporting period.

PRIVACY REQUESTS PROCESSING TIME MONITORING

The Director of Corporate Services tracks and records the time required to process each Privacy request as well as the elapsed time to complete the request. This is done individually for each request and timely status updates are reported to the Vice-President of Finance and Corporate Services as the requests are being processed. Updates are presented at each Board meeting on the Privacy requests completed since the last Board meeting, as well as the date of completion. The Director of Corporate Services compiles all individual Privacy request processing times and reviews this annually with the Vice-President, Finance and Corporate Services before completing the Annual Statistical report (see Annex B).

To date the CFI has not received any requests for the correction of personal information. However, if a request for correction of personal information was to be received, it would follow the same process described above for monitoring and reporting a Privacy request.

Since there were no Privacy requests during this reporting period, the CFI did not have any monitoring to conduct.

MATERIAL PRIVACY BREACHES

No material privacy breaches occurred during this reporting period.

PRIVACY IMPACT ASSESSMENT (PIA)

The CFI initiated a privacy impact assessment in 2015-16 with plans to complete it in 2016-17. Therefore we did not complete any PIAs during this reporting period.

PERSONAL INFORMATION DISCLOSURES

The CFI did not disclose personal information pursuant to subsections 8(2)(m).
